They are working on a renovation of the 'Heritage Room' at the Olmsted-Urban house. This room on the second floor has housed memorabilia from the Urbandale High School as well as early Urbandale. There is a collection of the yearbooks, Urbandale Blue Jay Chatter, a football helmet, baseball uniform and a whole lot of other items, including statements from the Urbandale Water Utility (why these?). They are going to work on the room and build new cabinets to better showcase the items.

that will form a plaza around the original school flagpole from the K-12 building at 70th and Douglas (now at the Olmsted-Urban house).

URBANDALE'S FLAG

In June, just in time for the 4th of July celebration, Mayor Bob Andeweg, during his State of the City report, unveiled the new Urbandale City Flag. This flag was the culmination of a community-wide process to design and define what we as the Urbandale community represent. The new flag honors our heritage and looks to the future.



This flag features six bold U's in light blue and white, intertwined to form a star on a dark blue field. These colors, symbolizing stability and peace, are legacy colors for Urbandale. The two colors of the U's represent the two counties where Urbandale is expanding. The U's coming together unite the elements of people, natural resources, businesses, schools, transportation, and local government into a stronger, more beautiful whole. The endless pattern symbolizes the community's ongoing journey forward together. The bright star against the dark blue sky represents a firework from Urbandale's Independence Day celebration and is a bold statement about a positive future for the community. William McDivitt

History of McDivitt Grove

One of the heritage family names in Webster Township is McDivitt. William McDivitt and his wife Sarah came to the area in 1853. He initially acquired 400 acres of

prairie land of which he retained 12 acres already plowed along a rural road that led west to the railroad and Ryder Corner. The rest of the land was located south along



what would later be called Merle Hay Road to where the St. Gabriel Monastery would be established.



In 1865 William's 17-year-old son died. Being the custom of the time for family members to be buried on family property, William set aside a corner acre as a burial spot. His wife Sarah later died in 1868 and was buried

there also. In 1870 William officially designated the one acre of land to Webster township as the McDivitt Cemetery. Today the Cemetery with its iron entrance sign is located at the intersection of 70th St. and Meredith Dr. in Urbandale.

In 1874 the McDivitt's second son, Francis, died at the age of 23. A tall memorial marks the family burial spot.

As more families settled in the area they wanted a school for their children. William donated land just west of the Cemetery and with other volunteers, hauled lumber from a nearby sawmill to construct a one-room country school



building. Opening in 1876 as Grove School, the school was to serve the children of all ages. The teacher might have as many as 40 pupils during the winter months when the farm boys were not needed as much for the farm work at home. At this time, the US flag bore 37 stars and U.S. Grant was our President.

The people in the area now felt the need for a local church to serve as the community gathering spot. By 1878 the McDivitt Grove Methodist Church was built just west of the cemetery. Besides church services there were weddings, christenings, funerals and church parties. During the summer, picnics were held on the grounds.

A post office had been designated on the McDivitt

property from 1879-1881 with Willima's second wife, Nancy, acting as the postmaster, to serve the farm families in the area.

McDivitt Grove had grown some during the years but not enough to be designated as a Community. Around 1930 church attendance was getting smaller and the church was only used for special occasions. In 1950 the building was torn down, though the original bell has been moved to the Urbandale United Church of Christ on 70th St. where it resides today.

William had to retire and the land was either sold or passed to family members. A 1914 map shows the names of L.J. Hammond, Wm. Eckey, D.S. Michael, J.G. Stewart, J.L. Olmsted and T.J. McDivitt as owning most or the property. The Chapel Hill Gardens Cemetery off Merle Hay Rd. would eventually be located in the area.

MEMORIALS

Verda Simon passed away at Calvin Manor on April 22nd at 94 years of age. She and Bob were long-time Urbandale residents raising their family at 7107 Oliver Smith Dr. In the early 1960s they were one of the couples instrumental in the founding of Aldersgate United Methodist Church at 3600 75th St. Susan (Guthrie) Bonnicksen remembers having Bob and Verda as Sunday School teachers. Verda was child's librarian at the Urbandale Public library for 17 years.

As long-time members of the Urbandale Historical Society they both contributed in a variety of ways. Bob was listed as a Board member but Verda was also actively engaged. On programs related to the schools, Verda shared her experiences with rural schools in Shelby County. They both so enjoyed pot luck suppers that preceded the many programs Bob planned. The couple took many trips throughout the state as Bob planned the destinations for the over 30 bus trips sponsored by the Historical Society.

Verda and Bob were married for 72 years and once they moved to Calvin Manor were unable to attend as many of the Historical Society events. They did enjoy, however, welcoming visitors to the Barn at Open House events and the Ice Cream Social with a friendly smile. Verda will indeed be missed. **Mary "Susan" Leutzinger**, 80, passed away on Wednesday, September 18, 2024. Mary was born on September 10, 1944 in Des Moines to Stewart and Bonita Neswold. Mary graduated high school from St. Joseph Academy in Des Moines and retired from Farm Bureau Financial Group. She and her husband Dick were long-time members of St. Pius X Catholic Church in Urbandale, IA. Together with her husband of fifty-five years, Richard, they raised a daughter, Jennifer. They have been long time members of the Urbandale Historical Society.
